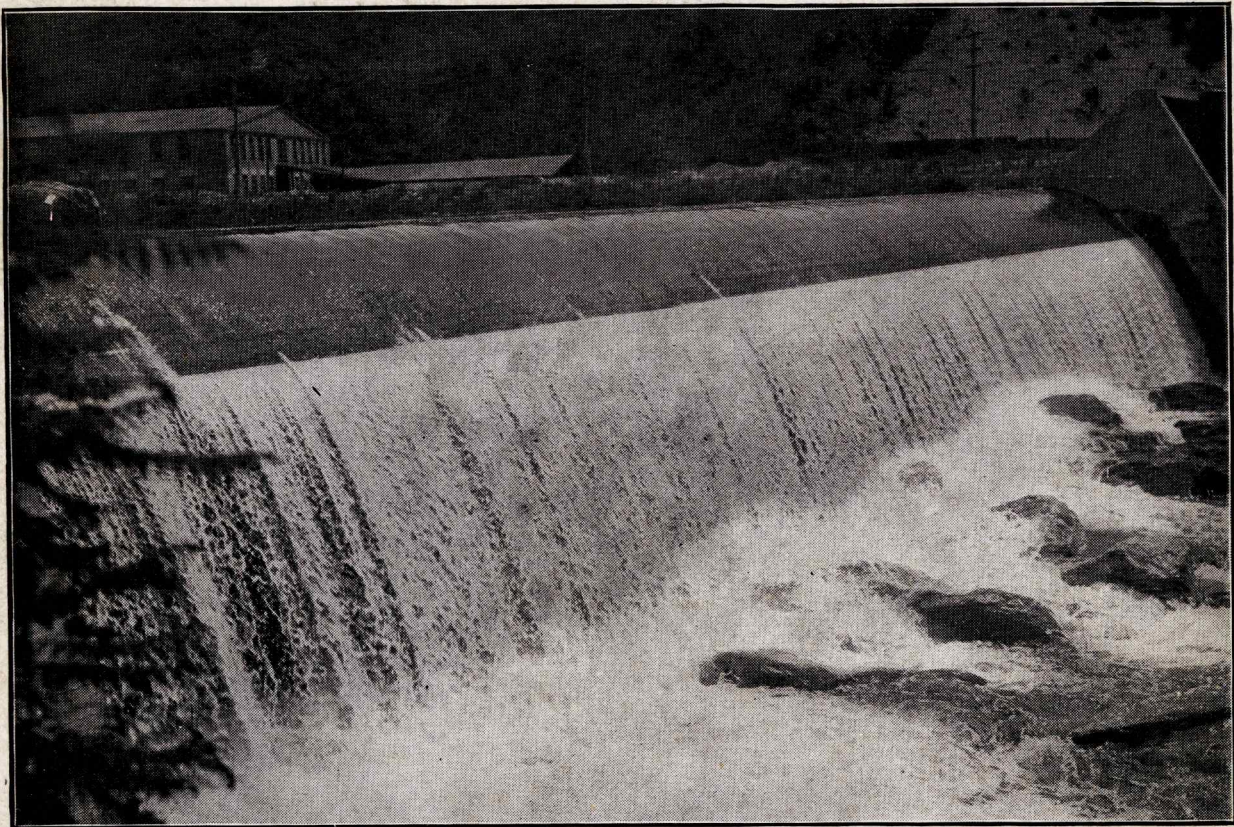

FALLS OF THE WESTFIELD RIVER AT RUSSELL, MASSACHUSETTS

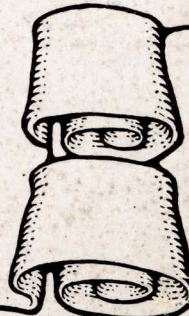

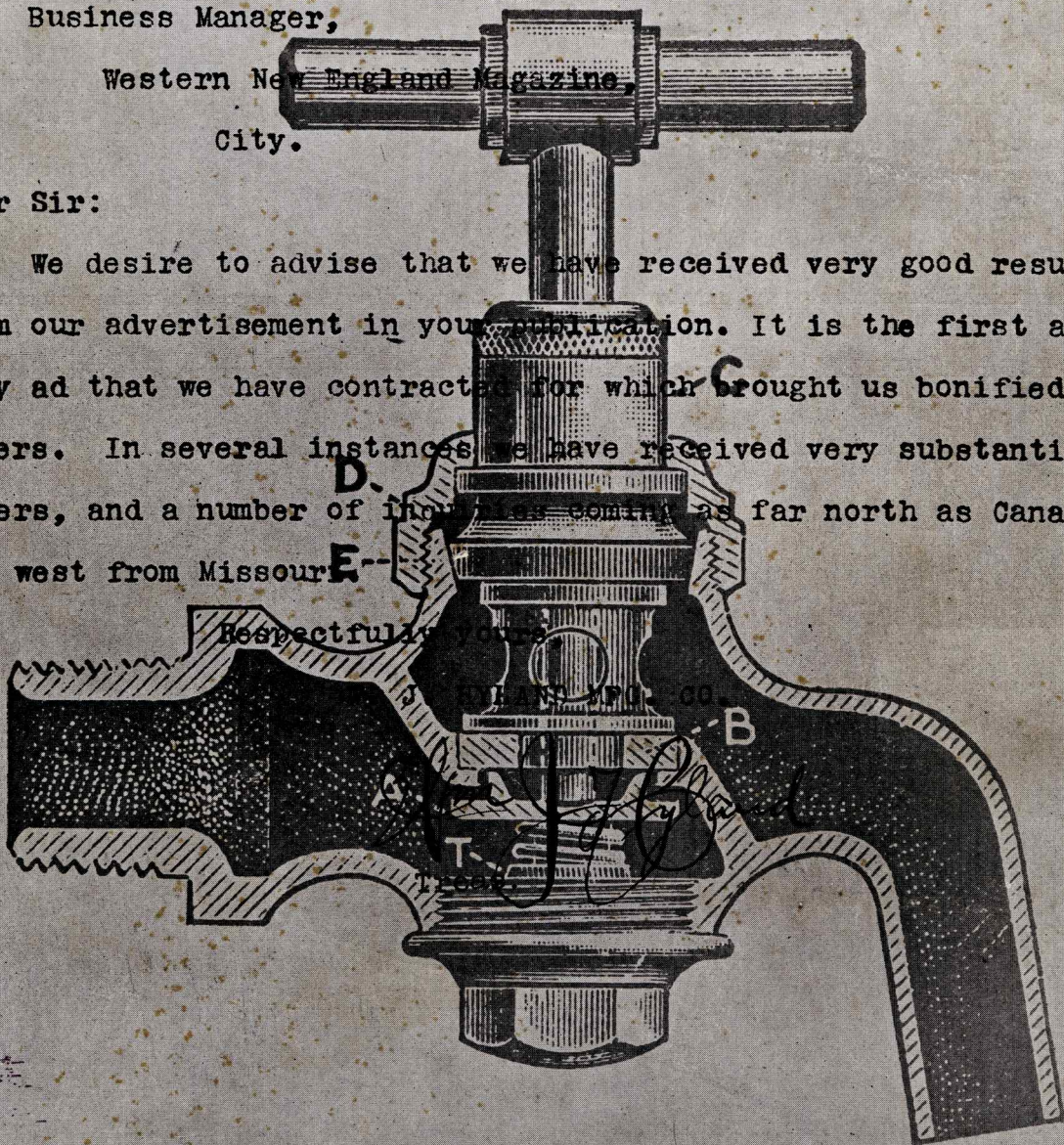
