McCoy, who was committed to jail at Northampton for the robbery at Worthington, has not been bailed out, as stated in our last.— A correspondent of the Hampshire Gazette, speaking of the examination at Worthington, says:—

"Mr. Potter [of Pittsfield,] managed the defense with much ingenuity, and did for them all that counsel could do. The evidence against them, however, was overwhelming. In the course of Dr. De Wolf's argument for the prosecution, he expressed deep sympathy for the father of McCoy, (who was present,) if he was in any way complicated in these robberies; but, if he had by work or example led on this child of his until he had been placed in the situation he was now in, he had no sympathy for him. The Doctor was earnest, as usual, and thrilling in his remarks, and the old gentleman (McCoy) trembled like an aspen, and the tears flowed freely."
